Court dismisses sex charges against scout leader

PLAISTOW, N.H. — Robert F. Wood, a former Plaistow boy scout official charged with sexually assaulting several cub scouts between the spring and fall of 1981, walked out of Plaistow District Court a free man Tuesday.

Special Justice Chariton Swasey, looking solemn and subdued behind the court bench, granted a motion by Wood's attorney, Barbara Fielden, to dismiss all seven misdemeanor charges against her client. Fielden, a public defender appointed by the court, pointed out in her motion for dismissal that under New Hampshire law the statute of limitations on misdemeanors prohibited Wood from being charged.

Under that law, an individual suspected of committing a misdemeanor must be charged within one year of the suspected incident. Wood cleared the statute of limitations by more than six months.

Swasey granted the dismissal, noting he had "no choice in that matter."

Plaistow Police Sgt. Steven Hanley, who prosecuted the case for the defense, offered no objection to the dismissal. "We feel there is no area for us to object to this motion," he told Swasey.

Wood exited the courtroom a free man shortly before 2:30 p.m. Tues-

day. The dismissal of all charges against him came on the 18th day after his arrest. He spent that time in Rockingham County Jail. His bail had been set at \$1,000.

Wood reportedly remained in jail under protective custody, afraid of reprisals from angered parents and residents.

But there was no unruly mob waiting outside the town hall Tuesday, despite earlier published reports that Wood would be cleared of the charges. He exited the courtroom accompanied only by his attorney and a second representative from the New Hampshire public defender's office.

Keeping his face hidden from photographers gathered at the Town Hall, Wood left the scene in a small white car.

Back at the police station, police appeared disappointed they were not given the opportunity to prosecute the case. But at the same time, Hanley seemed resigned to a legal decision based on the laws he is dedicated to upholding.

"Everyone wants to do what is right," he said, "but that is the way the law works."

Hanley, who conducted interviews with parents, and cub scouts allegedly involved with Wood,

acknowledged there were some threats of reprisals. But after learning of Wood's imminent dismissal, he questioned whether those threats would be followed through.

"I really don't know how people are going to react," Hanley said.

He did note, however, that the immediate reaction of parents was one of concern for their sons' welfare. And although understandable, that reaction may have hindered police in their investigation into the charges, Hanley indicated.

Many parents were unwilling to allow their sons to testify in court about alleged involvement with Wood, leaving police with little hard evidence, Hanley said. In addition, there was one suspected case of felonious sexual assault, a more serious charge than the misdemeanors brought against Wood. (Felonious charges involve suspected sexual acts, whereas a misdemeanor charge denotes no outright sexual activity, Hanley explained.)

But to charge a suspect with a felony, police must present evidence before a grand jury, which in turn issues an indictment if it deems the evidence worthy of a trial. Police and parents agreed the ordeal of appearing before a panel of strangers would be too much for a boy of 12,

and the pursuit of a felony indictment was dropped, Hanley said.

The statute of limitations in a felony case, Hanley noted, is six years.

Hanley said police made the decision not to put any of the youths through an unnecessary ordeal, and they stuck by that decision even when it became apparent they would have to drop the case.

"We came up with a saying: 'If we want the guy, we are going to have to sacrifice the kids,' he said, adding: "and we knew we couldn't do that."

For parents, the decision struck even closer to home. "A lot of parents were just not willing to open old wounds in their sons that could possibly be made worse," Hanley said.

But, despite Hanley's admitted eagerness to win a conviction in the case, the welfare of the youths involved remained uppermost in his mind throughout the investigation. "We can't imagine parents who hate this guy enough to put their kid through the ordeal of a trial," he said.

Alleged sex offender may be cleared, released from jail

PLAISTOW, N.H. — A former Plaistow boy scout official, charged with seven counts of sexual assault of minors, may be cleared of all charges and released from jail, The Gazette has learned.

Robert F. Woods, 42, of 5 Stanwood Ave., Plaistow, was arrested June 3, and charged with sexually assaulting boys under the age of 12 on several occasions during the fall and spring of 1981. The seven charges against Woods were all misdemeanors.

But, according to Police

Sgt. Steven Hanley, the New Hampshire statute of limitations on all misdemeanors is one year from the date of the incident to the date the suspect is charged, Hanley said. The Attorney General's office yesterday handed down an opinion on the case that the statute of limitations had expired and the charges should be dropped.

Hanley said police had hoped the Attorney General's office could find a loophole in the law since the case dealt with minors.

He added, Wood's public defender, Barbara

Fielden, indicated to police she will submit to Plaistow District Court a motion for her client's dismissal.

Wood, who currently is being held voluntarily in Rockingham County Jail on \$1,000 bail because he reportedly fears reprisals from angered residents and parents, is scheduled for trial in district court June 21.

"This is really unfortunate," Hanley said, referring to the statute of limitations expiration, because "it looks like there is not a thing that can be done."

Hanley said he expects Wood will remain in jail until the day of his trial, when a judge will be asked by Fielden to dismiss the charges.

Police say they were hampered in their investigation by parents who were unwilling to come forward with their sons' stories. Hanley said the first reports did not surface until late last month, and then only through a guidance counselor at Timberlane Regional Junior High School.

Wood was charged three days after police received the first report from

school officials, Hanley said.

According to Dennis Spurling, vice president of the Lone Tree Boy Scout Council, Wood served on the Whittier District Council in an executive advisory capacity until July 1981, at which time he was "forced to resign his post." Following the resignation, Wood was allowed to serve as a volunteer cub scout advisor until late summer or early fall, 1982, Spurling said.

Spurling would not explain why Wood was forced to resign in 1981.

Suspect in sex assaults declines bail

PEAISTOW, N.H. — Robert F. Wood, a former Plaistow scouting official charged with sexual assault of minors, returned voluntarily to Rockingham County Jail yesterday following his arraignment in Plaistow District Court.

Wood, 42, 9 Stanwood Avenue, Plaistow, was arrested at his home Friday and charged with five counts of sexual assault of a minor and two counts of indecent exposure, police said.

Wood entered no plea at his arraignment yesterday and returned voluntarily to jail because of feared reprisals from angered residents, police said.

Bail was posted at \$1,000, and a district court trial was set for June 28.

Police currently are investigating a "lengthy list" of names of youths under the age of 12 who may have been involved in the alleged assaults between June 1981 and June 1982, police said.

According to Dennis Spurling, vice president of the Lone Tree Scout Council, Wood served as a scout leader in Plaistow until July 1981, at which time he was forced to resign his post. Following the resignation, Wood served as a volunteer cub scout advisor until late summer or early fall, 1982, Spurling said.

Spurling would not say why Wood was forced to resign in 1981.

Chris Gilley, boy scout troop 18 committee member in Plaistow, said Wood was "not connected with Boy Scout Troop 18 on a troop or committee level. He was an executive with the Lone Tree Whittier District Council."

He said Wood served as a liaison between the Lone Tree Council and Troop 18.

William Moran, Lone Tree Council Executive, said this morning that Wood served on a Plaistow cub scout pack committee, but was unsure when or on what pack.

Man held on sexual assaults

PLAISTOW, N.H.

— A former Boy Scout troop leader was arraigned yesterday on seven counts of sexual assault involving two minor boys.

Robert F. Wood, 44, 5 Stanwood Ave., was arrested Friday afternoon at his home by Plaistow police.

The alleged assaults occurred between June and November of 1981 at the Meadowview Apartments in Plaistow and the Lone Tree Boy Scout Camp in Kingston, when the two boys were 9 and 11 years old, according to court records.

Former scout leader faces assault charges

PLAISTOW, N.H. — A former Plaistow Boy Scout troop leader was arrested late Friday and charged with five counts of sexual assault of a minor and two counts of indecent exposure, police revealed today.

Robert F. Wood, 42, Stanwood Avenue, Plaistow, was to have been arraigned in Plaistow District Court this morning in connection with the incidents involving youths all under the age of 12, Police Sgt. Steven Hanley said. The incidents all occurred between June, 1981 and June, 1982, Hanley said.

According to Dennis Spurling, vice president of the Lone Tree Boy Scout Council, Wood served as a boy scout troop leader in Plaistow until July 1981, at which time he was "forced to resign" his post. Following his resignation, Wood served as a volunteer cub scout advisor until late summer or early fall, 1982, Spurling said.

Hanley said Wood stayed voluntarily in the Rockingham County Jail on \$1,000 bail over the weekend because of feared reprisal from angered residents.

"We were aware that some people in town were intent on causing harm to Mr. Wood, he said.

Hanley indicated police investigations into reports by youths and their parents turned up a "lengthy list" of other children who were allegedly involved with Wood. "Our investigation also includes allegations that Wood may have had additional incidents with the same children over a period of time," Hanley said.

Although Hanley would not confirm the number of youths police suspect were involved, he said the "list does not contain more than 15 names."

Hanley said many parents and children are reluctant to get involved in the investigation, which did not begin until one child began suffering emotional problems, following his alleged involvement with Wood.

Police are urging parents who suspect their child may have been involved in the alleged incident to contact them as soon as possible.

Ex-Scout Leader Accused Of Sex Assaults on Boys

PLAISTOW — A former Boy Scout troop leader was arrested Friday on seven counts of sexual assault on two minors, police said yesterday.

Robert P. Wood, 44, of 5 Stanwood Ave., was arraigned yesterday morning in Plaistow District Court following his arrest Friday afternoon at his home by Plaistow police on the sexual assault charges.

According to Plaistow Police Sgt. Steven Hanley, the arrest followed an investigation which has indicated that approximately a dozen or more Plaistow area boys, between the ages of six and 11, were sexually assaulted.

Hanley said more charges may be brought forth at Wood's trial date, scheduled for June 21 at Plaistow District Court. Sexual assault is considered a misdemeanor, he said.

Wood is being held on

\$1,000 cash bail at Rockingham County Jail. Hanley noted that the father of one of the alleged victims was found outside the suspect's home seeking to "take out some of his anger" said Wood.

The alleged assaults occurred in the spring and summer of 1982, Hanley said, adding that Wood "was in a position to associate with the kids."

Wood served as a paid boy scout staffer in Plaistow until his resignation was sought and given, according to Dennis Spurling, vice president of the Lone Tree Boy Scout Council.

Hanley said he has been informed that some of the children have been involved in counseling. He said he has advised parents that every child must be dealt with on an individual basis.
