

### ORDER

AND NOW, April 15, 1985, the sentence of this court is that you, TIMOTHY J. BAGSHAW, undergo imprisonment for a period of not less than one (1) year nor more than three (3) years in such State Correctional Institution as shall be designated by the Deputy Commissioner for Treatment, Bureau of Dorrections and that you be sent to the Correctional, Diagnostic, Classification Center at Camp Hill, Pennsylvania, for this purpose. Credit shall be given for one (1) day served in the Centre County Prison on this charge.

This sentence is suspended on condition that:

- 1. You be on probation under the supervision of the Adult Probation Department of Centre County for a period of three (3) years.
  - 2. You pay the costs of prosecution.
- 3. You pay a fine in the amount of Five Hundred Dollars (\$500).

- 5. You comply with all conditions, rules and regulations as required by your probation officer.
- 6. You shall devote two hundred fifty (250) hours to a charitable purpose as assigned by the Community Services Program Coordinator to be completed within two (2) years of this date. This requirement is in lieu of incarceration.
- 7. Pay all fines and costs in accordance with a contract in which a payment schedule will be established by the Centre County Probation Office. This contract will be approved by the Court.
- 8. You undergo such counseling and/or psychotherapy as required by the Centre County Probation Office.

| On April 26th , Assistant Scoutmaster for Troop 361 in                |
| State College, called me at the Scout office and shared with me a     |
| concern that the parents of were upset and making an accu-            |
| sation that Tim Bagshaw, Scoutmaster of Troop 361, may have committed |
| some kind of sexual acts with their son. The occasions I was told     |
| from parents, were:   |
| (1) Tim Bagshaw invited on a ski trip for a weekend at                |
| the Poconos. They were to stay with relatives of Tim Bagshaw.         |
| Parent permission was given. When they arrived they stayed at         |
| a motel instead of a relative's home. Supposedly was ap-              |
| proached during that weekend by Tim Bagshaw but nothing happened.     |
| was instructed to tell his parents he had stayed with Tim             |
| Bagshaw's relatives, not at a motel. Please note - this was not       |
| a Scouting activity.  |
| (2) In January of 1984 at a camp-out with Troop 361 at the Seven      |
| Mountains Scout Camp, along with several other adults, Tim and        |

| The information came out when told a friend who is also a             |

felt some concern. then, over the next few days, called several other parents and had them confidentially talk to their sons to see if anyone else knew anything or were involved. This included talking to his two sons. After talking to all these parents, only one very minor incident, which happened more than 5 years ago, was uncovered. After feeling the pressure of a possible problem, Roger Rauch on the morning of April 26th at the Scout office for help. That very same evening Donald Bailey from State College - our Nittany District Chairman and a member of the executive board, and Roger Rauch went to the home of to further discuss the potential problem. It was our conclusion at the end of the evening that for the best interest of Troop 361 a troop committee meeting should be called and held as soon as possible and to include the Scoutmaster, Tim Bagshaw. This was scheduled yet that same evening for Monday, April 30th at the home of \_\_\_\_\_ Tim Bagshaw was also advised not to go on the April 27-29, 1984 troop canoe trip and did not.

#### Monday, April 30, 1984

The troop committee met with about 6 members present, along with Scoutmaster Tim Bagshaw, Stew Koontz (whom Tim invited), several assistant
Scoutmasters, Don Bailey, and Roger Rauch. All troop committee members
were also parents of Scouts in the troop. At the end of the meeting,
which lasted about 2 hours, it was decided that Tim Bagshaw should resign
as Scoutmaster because of some bad judgments he had made and that he
should consider getting some legal counsel and decide if he should react. Tim Bagshaw resigned as Scoutmaster that evening.

#### Tuesday, May 1, 1984

at which time he informed her that Tim Bagshaw has resigned as Scoutmaster last evening. On the same telephone call also felt that the Scout council should do more than that and even talk to all other families and run an investigation. I was not sure at that point what additional responsibility we had and indicated I would get

back to her. Meanwhile, I called Dick Campbell, our legal counsel, who had me meet with Amos Goodall later that afternoon. Amos got a copy of the law and we reviewed it, deciding we had already acted responsibly and that it was now up to the parents to file charges or take action since they were supposedly the hurt party. A copy of the law was given to Roger Rauch to give to the family, which he did later that evening.

We shared with them the information that it was their responsibility to report the matter to Child Welfare. Roger Rauch even offered to place the call for them if they chose to report the accusation.

wanted to report it very much so, but was not quite sure they should. It was my opinion there that they should get their own legal counsel and decide what to do. We left with the feeling that the would discuss the matter further and decide exactly what they wanted to do. We never heard from the again. I assumed they decided not to report. In our conversation with the parents of we never talked to the top of the parents did not want us to.

We only met very briefly as we walked out the door that evening.

#### Others

Never at any time in those few days did we try to investigate it on any formal basis. We felt it was one accusation from the family toward Tim Bagshaw. We did accept through the troop committee Tim Bagshaw's resignation as Scoutmaster and recommended that either party should act in their own best interest and that we would be willing to cooperate in any way. We felt this was their responsibility and acted accordingly. Also, I did advise Tim Bagshaw not to be involved in any form with our Scouting program and/or with any of the Troop 361 members. It was my feeling at that point that he would cooperate with this recommendation. Also at this time the National Office Registration Department was informed to remove Tim Bagshaw's name as Scoutmaster. On the weekend of May 18-20, 1984, Tim Bagshaw then showed up for about half an hour at

the Nittany District Camporee in Julian. Many of the Troop 361 members saw Tim there. This, I think, prompted other parents to be very concerned and encouraged many families to come forward unknown to us.

#### Friday, June 8, 1984

On Friday morning, June 8, Sgt. Madden of the Rockview office of the Pennsylvania State Police called me at the Scout office and informed me that an investigation was under way with Tim Bagshaw and that he would be arrested on Monday, June 11. He also informed me that I was being cited on a summary offense for not reporting a possible child abuse case to the proper authorities and that I would be receiving a citation that would be issued on June 11th.

#### June 11 and 12, 1984

On the evening of June 11th and on the morning of June 12th all the news media began calling me in reference to the State Police report they had received. Almost without exception each wanted a response from me why I failed to report it, kind of indicating why I was trying to cover something up. I responded to a few of the news media briefly and then tried to call Dick Campbell's office.

Also that same morning I was in touch with our National Office. I contacted Paul Ernst, the National Director of Registration, to report the Tim Bagshaw incident for the confidential list of volunteer Scout leaders. He suggested that I talk to Barclay Bollas in our communications department who in turn transferred me to David Park, an attorney for the Boy Scouts of America. Also during that time John Auman, Pennsylvania Associate Area Director, was consulted. David Park recommended to the council president, Jack Port, and myself that legal counsel be set up immediately and that Jack Port, council president, write a short statement to respond to all news media.

Tuesday afternoon, June 12, being unable to contact Dick Campbell, Jack Port and Roger Rauch met with Tom Torquato, a local attorney in Lewistown who also was in touch with David Park, who helped with the assistance of lining up legal counsel and the following statment for Jack Port:

"As president of the Juniata Valley Council, Boy Scouts of America, I totally support and stand behind our council executive, Roger Rauch, who we feel has acted responsibly and has done nothing wrong. We are currently working with legal counsel and we plan to vigorously resist any charges made on Roger Rauch."

Jack H. Port, council president, was advised throughout this complete matter.


#### Roger Rauch's feelings

- (1) I feel I acted responsibly in my job as council executive and should not have been cited.
- (2) I did seek out legal counsel and reacted on their advice.
- (3) I had no contact at any time with children only adults and parents.
- (4) I did not at any time wilfully not report it. It was my opinion that it was the parents' decision and responsibility. I even offered to call for them and report it if they had wanted me to and offered to cooperate in any way with anyone.
- (5) I did not appreciate being named in the news media in the same breath with the Tim Bagshaw arrest on a \$25.00 summary offense. This has really created a very bad and negative image and response on the council, myself, and the Boy Scouts of America.

# Former scout leader charged with sexual assault at camp

STATE COLLEGE — State Police at Rockview have arrested a former State College Boy Scout leader on sexual assault charges involving two boys in his own troop.

The incidents allegedly took place at the Seven Mountains

Boy Scout Camp.

Timothy John Bagshaw, 29, of State College, former assistant leader of Troop No. 361, Ferguson Township, was placed in Centre County Prison Monday in lieu of \$15,000 bail.

Police said Bagshaw is charged with 10 counts each of indecent assault, endangering the welfare of children and corruption of the morals of minors. A preliminary hearing is set for June 20.

The alleged incidents oc- ligate curred Nov. 18 19 and Dec. 16 - dent.

17, 1983, and Jan. 20 and 21, 1984, police said, but nothing was said of the matter until a little over a month ago.

Police declined to name the youngsters involved in the incidents. A police spokeswoman said the boys were probably State College area residents since they were members of Bagshaw's troop.

Also cited in the matter was Roger Rauch, Director of the Juniata Valley Council of Boy Scouts, Lewistown.

Police have charged Rauch with the summary offense of failure to notify the proper authorities of suspected child abuse.

When contacted at the boy scout headquarters in Lewistown this morning, Rauch said that he did not realize he was obligated by law to report the incident

rie said that about six weeksago the family of one of the boys made a complaint against. Bagshaw.

Rauch explained that at that time Bagshaw was asked to step out of his position as leader until-things were 'straightened out' and that the Boy Scout Council did not take either side.

Bagshaw then resigned.

"My understanding was that each party could then pursue whatever legal action they; wanted to," said Rauch. "I didn't realize that I was obligated to report this but I did offer the family my cooperation."

"I hope one bad apple in a thousand doesn't ruin the whole boy scout idea," Rauch stated.

State Police at Rockview are asking any parents or troop members with further information to please contact them.

# Ex-Scout Leader Charged in Assaults 2 Troop Members Allegedly Molested During Campouts

A former Boy Scout leader was arrested yesterday for allegedly molesting two members of his State College troop on weekend campouts last winter.

In addition, the executive director of the Juniata Valley Council has been charged with failing to report the suspected abuse to authori-

Timothy Jon Bagshaw, 29, of 229 S. Sparks St., State College, was arrested by Rockview state police on 10 counts each of indecent assault, endangering the welfare of children and corruption of minors.

A former Huntingdon Borough police officer who was in scouling for 22 years, Mr. Bagshaw had been assistant scout leader for Troop 361 at the time of the alleged offenses. Troop 361. which includes boys ages 11 to 18, meets at Radio Park Elementary School in State College.

Mr. Bagshaw is charged with sexually molesting two 13-year-old boys on separate occasions during troop campouts at Seven Mountains Boy Scout Camp in Potter Township, Each boy was alone with Mr. Bagshaw at the time of the alleged assault.

State police said one boy was allegedly assaulted on Nov. 18 and 19, and again on Dec. 16 and 17. The other was assaulted Jan. 20 and 21, police said.

During interviews with state police, both boys gave similar accounts.

Each boy told state police he shared a tent with Mr. Bagshaw, When Mr. Bagshaw and the boy were inside, Mr. Bagshaw zippered the tent and "locked" it with his boot laces, state police said. Then, Mr. Bagshaw joined the two sleeping bags and began indecently touching the boy, and asked him to reciprocate, according to state police.

Mr. Bagshaw told one of the boys that this

type of activity was normal and part of growing up, according to state police.

Huntingdon Borough Police Chief Dan Varner said Mr. Bagshaw was a police officer with his department from 1974 to 1975. Mr. Bagshaw was not hired after his probationary period because the size of the force was reduced, the chief said.

Mr. Bagshaw was released from Centre County Prison on \$15,000 bail this morning. His preliminary hearing has been scheduled for

In connection with the Bagshaw arrest, a citation was filed with District Magistrate Robert May vesterday against Roger W. Rauch. director of the Juniata Valley Council, Boy Scouts of America, in Lewistown,

Mr. Rauch, 39, of Reedsville, is charged with a summary offense of failure to notify the proper authorities of the suspected child abuse.

At that meeting, Mr. Bagshaw resigned as scoutmaster from Troop 361. He had been assistant scoutmaster at the time of the alleged offenses.

"We feel our policy is solid and that he (Mr. Rauch) took the proper steps and followed our procedures exactly," said Mr.

When discussing the alleged assaults, Mr. Bollas said he doesn't know how this type of. situation can be avoided. As with all adults who volunteer as scout leaders, Mr. Bagshaw was selected by community members and then checked through the organization's computer for any criminal convictions.

"The problem is that virtually everyone who gets mixed up in a situation like this is a, person with an impeccably clean record," said Mr. Bollas.

Looking to the positive, the charges and publicity may re-emphasize the need for parental involvement in scouting, he said.

"Typically, youth groups get one or two parents who volunteer, and the rest whether the group is the Boy Scouts, the YMCA or the Little League - consider it a babysitting service."

"A lot of this fell on my shoulders and it would have been helpful to have had more guidance," he said. "There are no procedures within Boy Scouts for dealing with this situation."
