STATEMENT FOR FILE OF CHIEF SCOUT EXECUTIVE

RE: WALLACE HARPER (AUDIOVISUAL)

I certify that the following statement represents the accurate facts in the case of the termination of employment of Wallace Harper, Assistant Director of the Audiovisual Service as of July 23, 1971.

An article in the New Brunswick Home News of Saturday, July 17, 1971 reported that Harper had been indicted by the Middlesex County Grand Jury on Friday, July 16 for lewdness and contributing to the delinquency of two teen-age boys, 15 and 16 between the period of ________, 1969 and ________, 1970.

On Monday, July 19 Snead Clift, Director of the Literature and Audiovisual Division, confronted Harper with the news article quotation at my request. Clift reported that Harper admitted "goofing", had engaged an attorney, consulted a psychiatrist and had suffered considerable anguish in the interim. He agreed to meet with me and discuss the charge openly.

I met with Harper at 8:00 a.m. on Wednesday, July 21 and Harper honestly and sincerely indicated the following:

- . He had on one occasion in the period in question invited the two minors to his apartment in East Brunswick, N. J.
- . He had posed them in the nude in several scenes for a period of about one hour and took several photographs of a sort considered by most people to be pornographic.
- . He did not use the pictures. He destroyed them.
- . He felt guilty about doing this and indicates it was the only time such an action took place.
- . He consulted a psychiatrist and does not feel he did much for him. After five or six visits, he discontinued the treatment.

- . He indicated the police of East Brunswick later obtained a search warrant for his apartment and confiscated some pictures, literature and files which he claims to have been storing for a friend.
- He does not know what motivated the "photography session".

 And he admits it was very wrong in retrospect.

A decision was concurred in by Alden Barber, Chief Scout Executive; Marshall Monroe, National Director of Manpower and Administration and the writer that his employment with the Boy Scouts of America would be terminated at once. This action was shared with Harper on Thursday, July 22.

Ex-Boy Scout Leader Is Placed on Probation

NEW BRUNSWICK — Former Boy Scout executive Wallace Harper was placed on probation for three years and ordered to continue undergoing psychiatric treatment yesterday in County Criminal Court.

The 32-year-old East Brunswick man drew the sentence from County Court Judge Joseph F. Deegan Jr. after pleading guilty to a lewdness offense involving two teen-age boys.

Harper, who was formerly employed at the National Head-quarters of the Boy Scouts of America in North Brunswick, waived trial last Nov. 18. Following his guilty plea Harper underwent exammation at the N.J. Diagnostic Center in Menlo Park.

The defendant, who lives at 129A Taylor Drive, East Brunswick, pleaded guilty to lewdness involving the payment of two boys who posed for obscene photographs between May 1, 1969 and March 1, 1970.
