

Dear Judge Blodden:

The defendant is not a man who is disturbed by his gender. He is not predisposed in the commission of a crime against so much a degree that he is dangerous to his own and welfare of others. He is an ex-homosexual with an interest in young girls. His approach to life seems more like his father's pastime so far, at least, and not like that of his mother. He became aware of his deviation early in high school. He has tried to overcome this drive by being overactive at church, Boy Scouts, and group therapy; all without success.

Leaville is in good physical health. There are no signs or symptoms of achieve or mental illness with the exception of his sexual deviation. This disease needs medical and therapeutic psychotherapy in order to bring about even a slight improvement. Shortly after arrest, he started treatment with Dr. Bellomy, a psychologist in San Francisco, but as the doctor "abandoned" his church, he discontinued therapy. Leaville is now being seen by a psychologist at College of the State College where he is a student.

This is a dependent, immature, slightly feminine boy in man of average intelligence. In addition to psychotherapy, treatment, and probably abstinence supervision, he needs lengthy probation supervision. I advise against a county jail sentence as such a period of time spent in custody would do more harm than good.

SECOND OF ARRESTS

The defendant's arrest record has been requested from both the Berkeley Police Department and the FBI but has not been received as of the writing of this report. He admits to being arrested for child molesting during 1964 but says that the charges were dropped because "I was going to a therapy group and was trying to work things out."

Defendant's Statement Regarding Offense: "I met [REDACTED] at church (Berkeley Park Chapel). He was just another member of the group with no reason to attract my attention more than anyone else. Upon occasion I stopped at his house to discuss church business & became acquainted with his family.

[REDACTED] mother began to encourage me to come around to see the boys and I became a sort of a member of the family. She told me all about their lack of proper relationship with their father. I guess it appealed to my fatherly instincts and I thought I could do something for them. I began to have sort of a pseudo-father-son relationship with them.

"The boys had constantly told me that they rarely had opportunities to go visit for themselves. I was taking a trip to Africa to look at the progress in a hospital development I had bought into. I was discussing with the Dykes that a triple bed would be big enough for the two boys so I wouldn't have to comb a room for four. She suggested I get a double bed as before arriving I would have both boys in bed with me anyway.

"We were sitting on the bed watching TV... my penis was visible as a small bump as though I had something in my pocket. One of the boys reached over & grabbed on it asking if it was money. I said it was me and we went back to watching TV. When he had touched me it was very stimulating and sexual, I guess, as sort of an emotional trigger.

"Later when we went to bed I lay there awake fighting with myself, before this time I had never had any sexual urges toward the boys. I slipped my arm around [REDACTED] & just layed there holding his penis. It woke him into [REDACTED] UJ's but he would not allow any of it. After the second try I gave up.

"In the morning I felt very guilty and apologized to the boys and explained that it was a very wrong thing to do. They said to forget it they would not tell any body and it all seemed to end there.

"Our relationship seemed to continue as before. [REDACTED] was to old for kisses & he also said that he was to old to be kissed but he never missed an opportunity to have my arms around him as long as he didn't think anybody would consider it a hug. But [REDACTED] who, according to his mother, had never had any fatherly affection seemed very anxious for both hugs & kisses. He got many hugs and when ever I was the one good night kiss.

"... I was there at night Greg was anxious to have me tuck him in. We would talk about secret things, as most young kids like to do. A month

(about) later my thoughts began to run back to the Hillite episode. One night I slipped my hand under his covers & took hold of his penis, he turned it and continued hitting, after a couple of times I asked if he didn't realize that I stop. He said "I didn't know," I told him to think about it because I would rather than have him begin to dislike me because of it. He said he would think about it.

"out of the time I would just hold his penis beneath his clothes. I never tried to masturbate him or to have him touch me."

Defendant's Statement Regarding Probation: "I feel that probation is a necessity in my case as I feel sure that imprisonment would surely do no more harm than good. I found the conditions of an a fine for only 6 hrs a day almost unbearable. Confinement confinement there would be a danger.

"I am attending school (Cal-State Hayward) studying toward a degree in Forestry

"The fear of this arrest will be sufficient to keep me out of trouble right now and by the time that we're off in treatment should be progressed to the point that I should have enough self-control."

SOCIAL FACTS

Background: The defendant was born on September 4, 1943 in Berkeley, California. She is one of two children born to the marriage of George Levitt, a mechanic, and Olive (Foothills) Levitt, a payroll clerk. He provides the following background information:

"I grew up in Berkeley. I live with my parents and always have. I don't remember much about my childhood, except bits & pieces. I remember my mother telling my father to 'lay off you let both (my sister) get away with murder but not George.'

"My mother told me that I rarely got spanked so I started crying before they could do so & then she didn't have the heart.

"I feel my father & I must have been searching for things to do together as we bought fishing rods & went fishing but it didn't last long, we lost interest.

"More recently my father & I have fought since I was in High School. About everything big & small. I find myself beating him, deliberately causing fights. I think most of the animosity is caused of his concurrent lack of interest in me as a person. He is more interested in whether I'm going to hurt my mother than anything else. I never get what's bothering you, can I help or anything like that, but what are you trying to do to your mother? He treats her pretty rotten & I think that this is sort of a guilt transference.

"My mother is overly emotional, gets hurt easily, and is very closed minded about her decisions made on a emotional basis.

"I have one sister 26 yrs old who is also mixed up though not as badly & in a different way. She is divorced & is now proceeding to screw up her kids possibly worse the we were.

"I attended school in Berkeley, I never really liked or disliked school.

except for one which I enjoyed very much, I am a junior at Cal-State Hayward studying for a degree in forestry."

The defendant continues to live with his parents at the present time. His parents make it clear that he is unable to communicate with his parents and that he is generally discontented with his school attendance. He is hopeful of obtaining residence in one of the Cal-State, Hayward dormitories in the near future.

Education: The defendant claims to have graduated from Berkeley High School in 1951. Berkeley High School has not as yet responded to our request for information.

The defendant received Associate of Arts degree at Merritt Junior College in June, 1953 after completing one year of college work. He was ranked in the middle one-third of his class academically.

The defendant is presently in attendance at California State College at Hayward. The defendant began attendance approximately one month ago and has not as yet completed a full semester.

The defendant also claims to have completed ten units of college work at Sonoma State College. This institution has not responded to our request for information.

Employment History: The defendant's most recent period of employment was as a junior at the Wardean Building Maintenance Company in Oakland. He held this position from April 1, 1960 to May 31, 1963 when he was discharged "unable to get along with the supervisor." His ability for the duties he performed was rated as fair and there were no reason to doubt his honesty. He was considered to be a disciplinary problem in that he "would not take criticism from supervisor trying to enforce company regulations." He was considered to be fairly cooperative but was not able to get along well with other employees. There is no possibility of re-employment.

The defendant's longest period of employment was doing clerical work for the U.J. Bloin Company in San Francisco. He was employed from February 1, 1967 to April 5, 1968. He voluntarily terminated this period of employment in order to return to school. His ability for the duties he performed was rated as fair and he was not considered to be a disciplinary problem. He was considered to be cooperative and was able to get along well with other employees.

From September 12, 1966 to January 31, 1967 the defendant held the position of shipping and receiving clerk for the A.I.R. Corporation in Oakland. His ability for the duties he performed was rated as fair and he was not considered to be a disciplinary problem. He was considered to be cooperative and was able to get along well with other employees. The listed reason for termination of employment is "left to get another job." He is not eligible for re-employment.

The defendant also claims 16 months employment with Grodin's of California. He says that he left this position because "I didn't get along with my boss."

Marital History: The defendant states he has never before been married.

nor lived in a common-law type relationship.

Military History: The defendant states he has never served in the Armed Forces of the United States. He advises that he is presently classified as 1-Y by his Lakeley, California Selective Service Board. He attributes his 1-Y classification to the fact that he has suffered from ulcers in the past.

Medical History: The defendant provides the following medical history:

"Appendectomy - 6-7 yrs old.; Ulcer - symptoms began 1961-1964 still have heartburn when under pressure. Left eye 20/35 as result of scars from an auto accident."

Financial History: As assets the defendant lists a \$5000 life insurance policy, a 1965 sunbeam Alpine automobile, \$700 equity in a lot at the Brooktrails development in northern California, clothing and stereo equipment valued at \$300. He says that his only current debt is \$200 which he owes on his BankAmericard.

Sexual History: The defendant classifies himself as homosexual only in respect to minor males. He says that he is not sexually attracted to adult males and that the idea of sexual involvement with such individuals is distasteful to him. The defendant states that he has often dated girls approximately his own age but has never been sexually involved. He provides two reasons for his lack of heterosexual experience. 1. "The girls I date aren't usually that type of girl" 2. "I don't believe in sexual intercourse before marriage."

As to his involvement with minor males the defendant admits to molesting "five or six" young boys before being arrested for the first time in 1964. He says that following his arrest he entered a program of therapy which had the effect of reducing his desire for young boys. During the year immediately preceding his arrest for the present offense he acknowledges two additional sexual contacts with pre-pubescent males. He claims that he did not seek out such contacts but became involved under unusual circumstances. He explained that he liked to hike in the regional parks and on various occasions came across minor youths who were experimenting sexually. He explained that seeing such activity would excite him sexually and would lead to his involvement. He steadfastly maintained that he had never used force or in any way threatened any of the minors involved.

The defendant would appear to have extremely limited awareness of the causes of his attraction to minor males.

Character Reference: The following character reference letter has been received from Reverend Larry McCracken, Associate Pastor at the Belrose Methodist Church in Oakland:

"I have known George Leavitt for nearly six months now, and have had opportunity to serve on various occasions as counselor for him. George seems to be quite aware of his problem, and certainly has made every effort to find help and assistance in combating this difficulty. He has never given us any concern here at our church in confronting any of the latent problems, therefore I would be more than anxious to see leniency expressed

be him, so as to be right conforme his rehabilitation, and I trust complete restoration into society. I believe he has been completely honest with us, and it is in regard to his direct interest in finding solutions to his problems. Therefore with the best of our judgment, as well as cooperation on the part of the church, I feel that we can assist him in this way. If I can be of further help or assistance to you in your assessment of what best adjustments are needed, feel free to contact me."

Psychological Information: A confidential letter from Dr. Frank F. Groves of the California State College, Chico, Counseling Services has been received. In general terms the letter indicates that the defendant is presently in therapy and will continue indefinitely in the future. It is further noted that the etiology of the defendant's difficulty is not as yet clear but it appears to reside in certain background experiences. Arrested emotional development and immaturity was also noted. Dr. Groves feels that the defendant is essentially not an aggressive threat to minors. He further feels that long term therapy is the only solution to the defendant's particular problems. Finally, he offers the opinion that imprisonment would eventuate in deterioration of his condition.

EVALUATION

Appearing before the Court is a 25-year-old male of above average intelligence. He is outgoing and friendly but noticeably immature. He is quite confused in the psycho-social area and seems to be experiencing a great deal of psychic energy in an as yet futile effort to resolve the problem. At first glance his involvement with other males would seem to be situational nature. The longer he discusses the situation, however, the more clear it becomes that he seeks out (perhaps often at an unconscious level) such incidents. Yet there is no clear indication that he is an aggressive threat to the welfare or safety of others. Mentally Disordered Sexual Offender proceedings seem highly desirable.

Should the defendant be declared not to be a mentally disordered sexual offender he would be a suitable candidate for probationary supervision.

RECOMMENDATION

It is respectfully recommended that the proceedings be suspended under Section 7300 of the Welfare and Institutions Code.
