Dear Mr. Mancuso:

On December 2, 1977 Bronx Council, Boy Scouts of America suspended you as Scoutmaster of Troop #270. At that time you were advised the matter was being held confidential between you and Council.

In a letter dated December 4, 1977 to Bronx Council President Ivan Warner, you requested a review be conducted to determine the specific reason for Council action resulting in your suspension. A review committee was established. A parent's meeting convened by you on December 12 was attended by the Borough Executive, Donald Porter and Morris Epstein, Executive Board Member. The names of the review committee were announced and met with your approval. The parents in attendance were advised that the action taken by Council was being held confidential between yourself and Council and that the entire matter would be reviewed by the committee with those persons concerned.

On December 20, 1977 you, accompanied by Mr. Petrolak, met with the review committee. At this time the details and nature of your suspension were discussed at length. At that time it was determined that the review committee would conduct further interviews with other parties involved and would report their findings to you at a later date. If necessary, you would again be invited to appear before them.

Subsequently, at your request, Donald Porter and Morris Epstein met with you at vour home on December 27. 1977. In attendance at that meeting were and At this meeting you requested opportunity to have representatives selected by you to appear before the review committee in your behalf. In addition, you gave us a letter from your Troop Committee signed by Mrs. Romano, Secretary, stating their complete support of you and requesting your exoneration. Also at this meeting agreed, if invited, to appear before the Review Committee in your behalf. This met with your approval.

You are advised that on January 4, 1978 the Review Committee met and interviewed all persons discussed with you when you appeared before them on December 20. In addition, your Troop Committee letter of support; statements of plus other statements which we have received since December 20, have become a part of the record. It is the feeling of this committee that any further statements on your behalf are unnecessary.

As a result of these interviews and the resulting information, it is the concensus of this committee that your methods of leadership do not measure up to the standards established by the Boy Scouts of America.

For this reason it is the decision of this committee that your suspension as Scoutmaster of Troop #270 is sustained and the Bronx Council, Greater New York Councils, is directed to recommend to the National Registration Service that your commission is Scoutmaster be cancelled as of the original suspension date, December 2, 1977. We regret that this action is necessary.

Enclosed you will find complete documentation relative to action taken by Bronx Council, Greater New York Councils to remove PATRICK A. MANCOSO, as Scoutmaster of Troop No. 270 sponsored by Community Center of Israel and Weisman Busch J.M.T. Post No. 742.

Tou should inticipate that Mr. Hancuso will initiate a request for a review of our decision by Region.

As Borough Executive, I have never experienced a more difficult case involving the removal of a Scout leader. It has presented the dilema of actual knowledge of deviate sexual behavior by parents and scouts who refused to take action against applicant because of fear of reprisal; or because they didn't want to get involved. It has been apparent also that parents completely disregarded his behavior since it was only rumor or because their son was not the one involved.

I am not looking for "Red Herrings", but with the increasing publicity given to new acceptance of deviate behavior resulting in changing morality parnapps we need to gird ourselves as to Scouting's stand in relation to community attitudes and standards of behavior, as the relate to Scouting.

If we can be of any help in this matter, in event of appeal, please let me know.

Dear Mr. Gayer:

You were advised on December 7, 1977 of action taken by Bronx Council, Boy Scouts of America to suspend Patrick A. Mancuso as Scoutmaster of Troop #276.

As indicated in that letter a Review Committee had been appointed at Mr. Mancuso's request to investigate the details of the action.

We wish to advise you that this committee has met with Mr. Mancuso and discussed in detail all information pertinent to the issue. In addition, the committee has met with parents and others involved.

You are advised that the decision of the Leview Countities has concluded that the nethods of leadership employed by Mr. Hancuso are not in the best interests of Scotting and do not measure up to the leadership standards established by the Boy Scotts of America.

For this reason Mr. Mancuso has been advised that his commission as Scoutnester has been cancelled.

Your institution should take immediate steps to recruit a replacement to assure continuance of the program. Should you have any need of assistance by this office, please advise me.

HERKAFTER REFERRED TO AS APPLICANT

In August 1977 it came to my attention as Borough Executive through Harold Chilton, District Chairman, Eastern District, Brown Council, that rumors were circulating concerning homosexual behavior of applicant with Scouts in his troop.

Charles Schinek, District Executive of Eastern District was assigned to investigge rumors and to secure any proof of misconduct.

Charles Schinck talked to father who indicated he had only heard rumors and stated that to his knowledge, his son never witnessed anything.

Charles Schinck spoke to parent who indicated she had only hearsay information concerning applicant.

Refused to make a statement.

A result of the second and second statements after consultation with President Ivan Warner, it was decided that action should be taken to suspend applicant.

On checking Troop \$270 Charter, it was discovered that applicant had signed as Head of Institution, as well as Scoutmaster. (See Appendix, Part II.) It was further noted that the I. R. and Chairman were the same person (ie. Hr. Sullo). We were advised he was applicant's "Thenchman". It was decided to approach applicant directly with President Warner's suspension latter. This was done on December 2, 1977 by me accompanied by Berr Rock, Vice Chairman of Eastern District (See Appendix, Fart II).

On December 4, 1977, a letter from applicant was received requesting a review of the situation (See Appendix, Part II).

President Warner proceeded to appoint a Review Scard Committee consisting of board members: Colonel Charles W. Ficke, Attorney, Felix Mercuric and Morris Epstein.

On December 12 Morris Spatein and Donald Porter attended parent's meeting called by applicant. (See Appendix, Part II).

Judge Warner directed me to put together all information germans to the situation. Copies were prepared of information in hand and sent to each Review Committee member.

Applicant was notified of review meeting scheduled for December 20, 1977 by certified mail.

Review Committee Meeting convened December 20, 1977. (See minutes of meeting, Appendix, Part III).

On December 21,1977, I received a telephone call from applicant requesting a meeting with me elsewhere other than in courtroom atmosphere. Morris Epstein and I met with applicant on Tuesday, December 27, 1977 at applicant's home. Present were Mr. Sherwood, Committee Member, Market Member, father of Present were Mr. Sherwood, Committee Member, father of boy named in and statements. Rfforts were made by applicant to illicit additional information from us concerning statements. Strong support in behalf of applicant was expressed by Misters Sherwood and Edelstein, stating accusations were groundless. A letter from Mrs. Romano, secretary of Troop Committee was presented to me (See Appendix, Part IV). Applicant was advised that he would have to await decision of Raview Committee. if invited, to appear with his son before the Review Committee to deny alleged misconduct of applicant.

On December 28, 1977, we received two additional signed statements from Scouts documenting additional incidents of molestation by applicant. (See Appendix, Part I Statements #3 & #4.)

On January 4, 1973 the Raview Committee interviewed the above persons. (See minutes Appendix, Part IV.)


As a result of information which came to light at the January 4 meeting, it was conclusion of counittee that he should be removed. Efforts have been made to secure written statement from Larry Durismo, former Assistant Scoutmaster to corroborate parallel statements by As of this date statement has not been received.

It was the conclusion of this Review Committee based on information at hand, that applicant is employing methods of landarship which do not measure up to standards established by the Boy Scout Program and recommend his services as Scoutmaster of Proop \$270 be terminated.

REVIEW COMMITTEE MESTING

JANUARY 4, 1978 RK PATRICK A. MARCUSO

The committee, in convening at 7:30 p.m., agreed to interview the family first. Chairman Epstein expressed appreciation for their appearance to assist in determining the facts in case.

The incidents in Statements No. 1 and 2, involving applicant and their son were read to the Edelsteins. Chairman Epstein expressed necessity of stating the truth concerning details.

stated he had been with applicant and had slept together in same bed. denied Statements No. 1 and 2, indicating that charges by these Scouts were untrue. When asked if he ever took a shower at camp, alone with applicant, he stated he could not remember. father, and long time Scouter, felt matter should have come to his attention at the outset of Council's knowledge, since he is parent of son involved. He indicated approached Mac Gayer, head of Community Centur, to lodge complaint. (Apparently no action was taken.) said she had told if they had any doubts concerning applicant's action, they should call the Council and not the counitres, because the Troop Committee was "stacked" (with applicant's "henchmen"). requested chance to read statements of the state io. 1 and No. 2. Chairman Spetain requested this be deferred until Committee had opportunity to question the and

In November 1975, while staying at Motel at Mystic Seanort, group was watching T.V. Present were applicant, (name not recalled). In full view of those present, applicant reached up and pulled down pants and rubbed his face on Jamie's buttocks.

When I became S.P.L. my mother limited me to two nights a week for Scouting because of other things, such as school work.

Applicant exhibited ownership of me and became incensed over my mother's decision.

Applicant paid for trips to motals, over weekends, to check out future troop campaites.

Camp Yahou incident (word clarification i.e. Button):

Troop was in formation. Applicant put his hand on the huttocks and rubbed up and down in full view of troop.

Appalachian Trail Trip:

Applicant and were always going sheed a couple of miles during rest periods. These periods were about 15 minutes long in duration.

was asked if he had ever ridden in front seat of applicant's car.

Answer was in the affirmative, and on many occasions. On a few occasions he tried to fondle me.

indicated he had learned about misbeavior of applicant in April of 1977.

Larry Derasmo, Assistant Scoutnester, told him he had actually seen sodomy, both oral and anal, performed by applicant on the second on mimerous occasions.

indicated, in April, two members of the Troop Committee, Carter Johnson and Anthony Pipulo, went to Troop Chairman and Complained of the Scoutnester's behavior. Johnson and Pipulo confirmed seeing things.

Chairman invited applicant to dinner in his home and confronted applicant with charges. Applicant did not deny charges, but stated need not worry since his son was not my type".

resigned and son left troop.

indicated that he asked Armacide why he did not go further and oust Scoutmaster Hancuso. His reply was, "No one wants to get involved."

Subsequent action came when applicant put Jack Scardle in as chairman of troop.

indicated he had asked "Who is Jack McArdle". Applicant became indignant and stated that unless McArdle became Chairman, he would quit as Scoutnaster.

called McArdle concerning accusations against Scoutnester. He indicated McArdle passed matter off as "kid stuff".

Judge Warner asked, "After you learned of these incidences in April of 1977, did you permit your son to go on trips? Answer was "No".

In May 1977, continued to air the incidents. This turned into a confrontation between myself and applicant.

Applicant accused me of trying to destroy the troop and to start one of my own.

During the meeting, applicant left for about one hour and on his regime confronted me by asking if I had any proof of accusations. I indicated that I did not.

Questions were asked concerning Larry Bursano.

indicated he was a person with an "unusual lifestyle" and that he had told Charlia Schinck (Restern District Executive) that he had witnessed several acts by applicant.

In april of 1977, applicant made arrangements to camp at some farm. Applicant and went shead of the troop and were separated from troop for over three hours.

Applicant and never came after troop. Police found Par and farmhouse.

When asked the same question, indicated that applicant never made any advances to him.
When was asked if applicant ever took him alone to a motel over a weakend to check out future competes, he replied, "Yes, many times."
(_Author's note: On this question it was noted that modded her head in affirmative several times.)
The committee requested that the two sons leave so the parents could be talked with further.
indicated she could give many reasons why the applicant should not be Scoutmaster. Among other things, he is a highly biased person. He also left the troop unattended on too many occasions.
Don Porter reminded that are a meeting held at applicant's home (called at applicant's request on December 27, 1977) he was present and in support of applicant. He said "yes" when asked if he would appear in support of applicant.
It was stated to the the that that and the their statements as made. They were advised the Review Committee had additional statements citing misconduct that did not include their son. These letters were shared.
indicated he too, at times, had suspected homosexual incidences, but discounted them as rumors.
The very very advised that a number of people had been approached in effort to secure written statements, but "they didn't want to get involved since their sons were no longer in the Scouts". For this reason, and because others have flatly refused to give evidence, this matter has been difficult.
The council moved directly to remove applicant.

It was his decision to set up a parents meeting on Monday, December 12, 1977, to confront Council in effort to expose reasons.

Applicant was advised that Council was concerned in keeping this matter between

him and the Boy Scouts of America.

Dear Sirs:

As concerned parents of the Boys in Troom 270, we have been made completely aware of the serious charges made against scoutmaster Pat Mancuso. Having some knowledge of the events leading up to these accusations, We are not at all surprised. Our primary concern is that Mr. Mancuso is exhonerated of these unfounded charges.

The timing and sequence of events leading up to these charges is "curiouser & curiouser." As with any charges of this nature, we believe it behooves the Bronx County council to consider the source and the reasons.

We have discussed these charges <u>nuite openly</u> among both the parents and the boys of our troop. The reaction has been outrage at the charges. As far as we are concerned, we firmly believe the charges are based on jealousy and vindictiveness and we are convinced that they are unfounded and are meant to destroy the reputation of a man who has been concerned with boys and scouting for the past 15 years.

It is our sincere desire that these proceedings be quick and favorably concluded.

The alleged accusers have a history of hostile relationships with both the parents and the boys of our troop. And since you have obviously

conducted a thorough investigation, we are at a loss to understand why no current parent or scout has had the opportunity to be questioned.


We should also like to point out that the allegations begin in 1973. We are all curious as to why a person who is so concerned with his welfare and that of the other boys could possibly have continued on in the troop as an active member under those circumstances.

It cannot be said that the charges were unknown Prior to the receipt of the letters mentioned at Mr. Mancuso's hearing Tue. Dec. 18, 1977.


The reason we were aware of the nature of the charges, is that they were made by the parents of one of the boys who wrote the letters to you. This smacks of revenge because the party concerned could not have their way. Our committee runs the troop in consultation with the Scoutmaster. One individual family has never, and will never, rule our troop. And they certainly tried hard to do just that.

It should also be mentioned that this is not the first attempt by these people to destroy our troop. They not only have organized another troop but have also approached other parents and boys of 270 for the purpose of joining them in this escapade which is completely inconsistant with the morals and principals of scouting.

We implore you in the interest of justice to exhonorate our scoutmaster, and at the same time take appropriate action to prevent the recurrence of these unpleasant eyents.

TROOF #270 PARENT'S MEETING FREPARED BY DOMALD PORTER, BOROUGH EXECUTIVE

On Honday P. M. December 12, 1977 I received a call from a Mrs. who identified herself as Secretary of Troop #270 Parent's Committee. She requested my presence at a committee meeting being held that night concerning the suspension of Patrick Mancuso as Scoutnaster.

The atmosphere was cool. After my insistence that the Scouts were not to be in attendance at meeting, they were removed to another room to continue their meeting.

Mr. Chairman, opened meeting and arbitrarily stated all troop activity was being suspended for one month. Mr. Temoved himself from presiding and a Mr. Temoved was appointed to preside.

I advised committee that Mr. Mancuse's suspension should not result in cancellation of all troop activity as it was responsibility of Troop Committee to continue program.

Mr. opened meeting by indicating the suspension evidently was a result of suspected homosexual behavior on part of Scoutmaster Mancusco I was questioned as to specific reasons by P. It was most apparent that the parents present were aware of accusations which had been made last June by one family and which had been theown out as unfounded.

Every effort was made by P. Mancuso and aprents to get me elicit information in our hands. President of the Community Canter, went directly to the Chairman and stated publicly he was to be the Institutional Representative as of that date.

After meeting one perent stated to me "Pat doesn't stand a chance". "He's not bright enough to face a Review Committee." I asked him if he had any information that would help the committee. He stated all he had was rumors like sveryone else.

This letter is to call your attention to the fact that the Greater New York Councils, Bronx Borough Council, has seen fit to suspend Patrick A. Maneuso, Scoutmaster of Troop 270, as of Friday, December 2, 1977.

Since this has caused concern, I recommend that in the future, any charter submitted be completed with the proper officials, to avoid misunderstanding.

We will keep you advised of developments concerning this matter.


