Dear Mr. Miller:

I received your letter this morning and my first response was to phone you, but in considering that and the nervousness I feel, I decided that I could more fully communicate my feelings on paper.

And I accept them as being valid—the specifies of which me to admit this to you, and to the difficult aspect of this confession is that I have never been in and have continually mourned its occurrence. This has not been my history.

I worked with the scouts at Meriwether for four summers and have been Youth Director for a church down here for four years and therefore have worked with thousands of young people, and this kind of thing has never happened before, nor has it since. I suppose the situation would be made easier for you if I could admit to this having occurred in scouting before, then we all could see that I was sick and in need of psychiatric help. I wish it were that easy, then I would not be living in the confusion I have been since feeble and weak we as men can be and I am no longer as confident of my strengths as I was before.

None of this is to deny my guilt, it is just an explanation to focus my condition. After what happened at Christmas, and I tried to talk it out and make tense out of it. We had grown very close during the summer and had written frequently during the Fall. We had a rich friendship and one that I covet. After the event at Christmas the friendship collapsed. We both tried very hard to understand why it happened. I felt and still feel a tremendous fusion has increased. And I wrote each other and I spent over and I me telling you this because I do not want you to think that took what happened lightly. Up to this point it has been the

Nobody likes to have the "bad" in them revealed, especially something as serious as this, but even more, nobody likes to have something "bad" revealed about them that they themselves had never expersioned before and therefore live in confusion about it. Because counseled with.

I so not at all sure of how many details you have about what happened.

I feel it necessary to tell you however, that I in no way expected
or anticipated the event to take place. We were going to Meriwether

Staff Party there. In other words, there was no fore-knowledge on either of our parts that this would happen. That it happened is true and it was a terrible mistake on our part. Because I am the adult I assume the responsibility, though the reason for its occurrence is not at all clear to me. I realize how naive that sounds for a young man my age, but I honestly do not anderstand what led us to it---for as I said, it has not been my history.

I am a firm believer in hope. I believe man can overcome great obstacles. That God's love is a healing agent, especially in lives that seem torn apart and in broken relationships. I have three specific hopes I'd like to mention: (1) that will grow from this experience instead of regress and that his family will forgive him—and possibly me; (2) that I will from this experience grow and gain insight into my behavior; and (2) that you and all the others in the BSA who know about this will still remember what ever contribution I made to Scouting and will find it in your power to accept and forgive me—though still hold me responsible. The Scouting fraternity has been like a second home for me and it hurts me greatly to know that many of you are keenly disappointed and shocked by what happened. I assure you, there is no one in greater shock then myself.

I am sure your trust in me is at an all time low-but if you see fit to believe me, please know that this never occurred with any other staff member of last years staff or of any other years staff. I am grievous that the implications of what happened could lead to that possible assumption.

I am deeply disturbed that my final official connection with Boy Scouting is concluding on such a sour note. My regret is deeply felt. I appreciate your confidence in this matter. I know how difficult it is for you and for that I am sorry. I so wish to go on making some contribution to life and the church and I am confident that it is possible.



Dear Jim:

I have just received in writing a most serious morels charge against you by a Meriwether staff member and his father. I have discussed the matter with them at some length, and there appears to be little diestion as to the validity of the complaint. As the Scout Executive of this council I have but two alternatives: if you feel the charge is unjust and wish to light it, it will arrange upon your return from school to have you meet face to face with your accuser and have the opportunity to refute his claims. At the same tire I would find it necessary to launch a comprehensive investigation with other members of the Meriwether staff to ascertain if others might have similar to mplaints.

If there is no valid basis for the charge, this would provide an opportunity for you to clear yourself. If, on the other hand, there is some foundation, this could prove to be a very sticky situation.

The other alternative left of to me, if you accept the complaint without challenge, is to place your name on the confidential list with the Boy Scouts of America, which means that you no longer at any time or in any place can be registered as a leader in Scouting.

Jim, this is not at easy responsibility that I must shoulder, particularly in light of your fine contribution as earnp chaplain the last three years. However, I have no alternative. In neither of the cases listed above would knowledge of the situation go beyond those absolutely necessary to verify the facts, and in no case are there any legal implications. The Boy Scouts of America makes no charge against you; the organization simply exercises its prerogative of denying adult registration. From here will go either way you wish. If you are interested in proceeding further I will expect a letter within the next week; if I do not hear, I will take the second course.

It has apparently taken him from Christmas vacation until now to get his thinking straight so that he could call us to relate the episode to us and read a letter that he had written to Jime He has had wonderful conseling from the house father of the dormitory at school and we know that he is standing on Principle in the stand that he has taken.

These are the facts as they were related to us by I am sending him a copy of this letter to ask him to sign it if the facts have been properly stated or to add whatever he feels is necessary to clarify the information presented.
