



After a careful review of the entire history of your interest and relationship to Scouting, it is our considered judgment that you should end your efforts to become registered as a Scouting leader.

As you know, because of your past association with Scouting, the Boy Scouts of America is primarily concerned with inculcating its objectives of character development and citizenship training in the lives of youth and registration as a leader in this program is a privilege and not a right.

In keeping with these objectives, the Scouting organization has always reserved the prerogative of accepting applications from those individuals it feels are best qualified to give the kind of leadership that this organization wishes for boys enrolled in the Scouting program.

Occasionally, the Boy Scouts of America decides that, in its best judgment, it is unwilling to accept an application to commission an individual for a leadership role. A review of the Liontakis case shows that two different Scout executives have "checked him out." Both of them arrived at negative conclusions even though the evidence of his misdoings was never brought to trial so there has been no legal conviction.

It has been suggested to him that if he did take a lie detector test in his home community we would consider the results. There has been no commitment to do more. He has submitted copies of correspondence with the hief of police at Huntington, West Virginia inquiring about the lie dejector test. The response suggests they would be reticent to do it since he is not currently under indictment for are there charges against him presently.

After studying the file it is my judgement that he is not the kind of man that should be im Scouting. He appears to be emotionally unstable, he has sought vindication from those that have disagreed with him. The most recent of a substantial list of known hate actions were nuisance phone calls that were definitely traced to his phone.

I have prepared a suggested letter for Alden's consideration since he has indicated his interest in responding.



Thank you very much for your letter of inquiry concerning Mr Louis Liontakis. He is correct, he did talk with me at the Jamboree about his status in Scouting.

Mr. Lientakis is listed with us for suspicions of immorality with boys. However, his position is that he was victimized by a neighbor with whom he had had difficulties that culminated in fisticulfs, hospitalization and assault and battery charges.

He applied for a position on the GHQ Staff at the Jamboree and it was in connection with this that we caught on to his situation. He then visisted the Jamboree for the purpose of reviewing his case with me. The following are the notes I made and placed in his file following his visit:

"At the Sixth National Jamboree held at Valley Forge,
Mr. Liontakis came out for an afternoon and we spent a
couple of hours tolking under a tree near the top of
the arena. He has had some difficulties with some of
his neighbors. There is some hint of moral instability.
Although this individual is extremely anxious to be reinstated in Scouting. I cannot recommend that we take any
positive action until he has proven his stability in his
employment and in his personal life."

In direct response as to how he could go about correcting the "false" image that we have of him and because he indicated an intense interest in doing something in the public relations field in Scouting, I did indicate to him that,

although we could not accept his registration, if he wished to pursue the matter further he might contact you with the idea of working in an unregistered capacity on some special public relations assignment in your council.

This I did because I knew that you would keep a reasonable watch on him with the idea that, over a period of time, we might be able to form a better judgement as to whether he really has been a victim and is actually okay, or whether he is masquerading under a false front. If he has something to offer in the public relations field that is at all worthwhile, this would give him an opportunity to "prove" himself to us while being of "unofficial" service to the organization. Under no circumstances should he be allowed to be associated with boys in any relationship.

That is the essence of the story. I would like to say this final word.—
If you are willing to go along with this, fine; however, if you feel you don't
have the time or want to become involved or feel that the potentials are not
great enough or that the liability and risks are too great, by all means close
the door. I did not, could not, make any committeents to him. We are under no
obligation to him in any way, shape or form.

Will be interested in what you do. Thanks for your understanding and for writing.
