Former Hudson teacher guilty of morals offense

CAMBRIDGE — A 34-year-old former Hudson school teacher faces sentencing today following his conviction Wednesday for the kidnapping and sexual assault of a 15-year-old youth last summer.

At the conclusion of a three-day,

jury-walved trial at Middlesex-Superior Court, Judge Nell Colicchio found John Leavis of 25 Laurel Dr., Hudson, guilty of the charges of kidnapping, assault by means of a dangerous weapon and rape and abuse of a child.

Leavis, who resigned his position as a fifth grade teacher in the Hudson school system last winter, still faces trial on seven charges of indecent assault and battery on children under the ag e of 14.

The three counts of indecent assault and battery on a child under.

14 stem from a Feb. 9 arrest of Leavis, following a joint investigation by Hudson and Boxborough police.

According to Boxborough Police Chief Robert Johnson, the arrest was made after a 9-year-old boy who

Leavis as a last year complained to his who live in Boxborough—he had been sexually assaulted by Leavis.

Hudson police said the investigation included interviews with four youngsters who had with Leavis as under the care of the during 1977.

Sentencing in the case involving the 15-year old was scheduled for 10 a.m. today. According to the district attorney's office, Leavis could be given a life sentence.

As the trial was about to begin Monday, Leavis invoked his right to have his guilt or innocence decided by a judge instead of a 12-member jury.

Prosecutor Richard Kelley alleged

Prosecutor Richard Kelley alleged that Leavis, who worked last summer as a counselor at a New Hampshire camp, picked up the youth hitchhiking in Bolton the evening of Aug. 2.

Leavis allegedly threatened the youth with a hand gun and forced the 15 year-old to accompany him to a house in the Marlboro area.

Once in the house, Leavis allegedly sexually assaulted the youth and later drove the youth to his original destination.

Kelley's case was based on the victim's identification of Leavis as his assailant and on evidence that the defendant possessed a hand gun like the one used to threaten the youth.

Wednesday - defense attorney William Kittret - presented evidence Please place Leavis on confidential list

that neither Leavis' automobile nor his home matched the victim's description of the vehicle and house in which he was confined.

The prosecutor, however, argued he had not claimed that the kidnapping and attack had occurred in either, the defendant's own car or home.

Kelley pointed out that Leavis had access to several other houses and vehicles at the time of the incident.

Following the return of the guilty verdicts, the judge continued the case until the morning to prevent the two attorneys time to prepare their recommendations on sentencing.

According to Kelley, Leavis has no prior criminal record.

The three charges were logged against the defendant this past February after the victim reportedly identified Leavis from photographs shown him by local police.

The charges on which Leavis was convicted were lodged after he was accused of the seven indecent assaults.

Teacher sentenced in Hudson sex abuse

HUDSON — Former elementary school teacher John C. Leavis, 33, was sentenced this week in Middlesex County Superior Court in Cambridge to Bridgewater State Hospital's treatment center for from one day to life, after hospital psychiatrists determined him to be a "sexually dangerous person."

Sentencing was postponed in May when Leavis, of 25 Laurel Drive, was convicted of kidhapping, assault and battery with a dangerous weapon, and carnally abusing a 16 year-old boy.

Judge Neil Colicchio had ordered the defendant placed under psychiatric evaluation.

The sentence handed down this week means Leavis will be committed to Bridgewater, where he could remain the rest of his life.

The former Forest Avenue school teacher and Boy Scout master was arrested Feb. 9, and was convicted after a 16-year-old boy identified him as the man who offered him a ride, abducted him at gunpoint, and forced him to engage in sexual acts.
